ACCOMMODATIONS

Blocks of rooms have been reserved in two lodges at the YMCA facility. Eastside lodge and Ypsilon Lodge both have rooms accomodating up to 6 persons, including one or two bunk beds. The rooms all have private baths; towels and bedding are provided. Meals are provided as part of the room cost, and are served in the conference dining room as all-you-can-eat buffets. In addition, the Rustic Cafe located in the lobby of the Administration building offers hot and cold sandwiches, snacks and beverages (these are not a part of the prepaid meal plan). There is a coin-operated laundry available at the YMCA facility, as well as a library with internet access. Phones are located either in the rooms (Ypsilon lodge) or in the lodge hallways (Eastside lodge); wireless access is available in the lobby of the Administration building.

PARKING is not a problem at the YMCA facility. There are ample parking lots with easy access to the buildings that we will be using.

The town of Estes Park, however, is a popular resort and often is congested with traffic. Traveling back and forth between Estes Park and the YMCA Center may be more time-consuming than you would expect given the distance.

We have arranged for buses to transport everyone from the YMCA Center to the Stanley Hotel for the Awards Banquet. You will not need to negotiate the mountain roads or the streets of Estes Park to attend the banquet, just relax and enjoy the evening.

WEATHER and ALTITUDE

In August, typical weather conditions at the Estes Park Center/YMCA include daytime temperatures in the 70's (degrees F) and cool nights- perfect for outdoor activities! Rain- even an afternoon thunderstorm- is possible so bringing rain gear may be helpful. Also, the chance of sunburn increases at higher elevations because of the thinner atmosphere, so be sure to come prepared with sunscreen and sunglasses.

The YMCA is located at an elevation of 8,010 feet above sea level. At elevations from 8,000 to 10,000 feet above sea level, oxygen is approximately 45% less dense, and there is less humidity- 50 to 80% less than in lower elevations. Altitude sickness can affect anyone, no matter what their age or level of fitness. Nearly everyone who visits from lower elevations will initially experience shortness of breath. Some may also experience fatigue, dizziness, headaches and nausea. Most people adjust to the altitude within a day or two. Follow these tips to enjoy your stay in the high country:

- Eat lightly
- Drink plenty of water
- Avoid excessive alcohol
- Get plenty of rest

TRAVEL

Arrival by Air:

Make arrangements to fly into Denver (Denver International Airport : General Information: 303-342-2000).

The **Estes Park Shuttle** offers 5 trips daily between the Denver airport and the YMCA Estes Park Center. The trip from Denver to Estes Park takes 2 hours whether you take the shuttle or drive it yourself. Cost for the shuttle is **\$65.00 round trip**, which represents a discounted price for the SON meeting. For reservations call **970-586-5151** and have your flight information handy, as they match arrival and departure times to the airlines, be sure to mention you are with SON to get the discounted rate. They recommend reserving your seat on the shuttle as soon as you have plane reservations to assure a place.

Arrival by Car:

From the East (I76-Greeley-Loveland) Take I76 to Hwy 34 (Exit 73/Greeley), then Hwy 34 west to Estes Park.

From the North (Cheyenne-Fort Collins) Take I25 south to Exit 257/Loveland, take Hwy 34 west to Estes Park.

From the South (Denver-Boulder) Take Hwy 36 north to Boulder and on into Estes Park

Once you reach Estes Park, take **Elkhorn Ave** (Highways 36/34) west to **Moraine Ave** (Hwy 36). Turn south (left) on Moraine, to the **Hwy 66-spur** turnoff. Turn south (left) on Hwy 66 and follow this road to the Estes Park Center/YMCA of the Rockies.

SUBMISSION OF ABSTRACTS

Abstracts must be submitted by April 15, 2004.

Instructions for all Abstracts: Abstracts must be submitted online, using the Abstract submission form on the website at http://www.nematologists.org This includes regular submissions as well as submissions for the Student Paper and Poster competitions. Abstracts will be presented in a meeting program booklet that will be distributed at the meeting. This version is unedited; therefore, you are requested to have your abstract reviewed by two colleagues before submission.

Abstracts for oral and poster presentations will be published in the Journal of Nematology. This version is edited before it is accepted for publication. The abstract may be returned to the author for revision. Payment should accompany the abstract at \$35.00 per abstract. If a paper or poster is not presented at the meeting the abstract will not be published.

An author may be the speaker for only one oral presentation for which an abstract is submitted, but may also present posters.

Time for oral presentations = 12 minutes, plus 3 minutes for discussion.

Either an LCD projector or a 35mm slide projector will be available for oral presentations. Please note your request on the abstract submission form. Laptops or computers will be available, and presenters should bring their talks prepared on a PC-compatible CD, in Powerpoint or Powerpoint-compatible format. At present we do not have support for other software formats, but please contact your session chair with any further questions. All talks will need to be preloaded before the beginning of the session.

No refunds will be made for presentations that are withdrawn.

ABSTRACT STYLE AND FORMAT

Abstracts must adhere to the following style format:

A STUDY OF NEMATODES: AN EXAMPLE OF AN ABSTRACT TITLE. **Author**, **A.B**, **C. D. Coauthor**, **and E. F. Lastauthor**. ¹ Department of Nematology, A Good University, Somewhere, NE 68582, ²Agricultural Research Center, Elsewhere, CO 65432.

The first line of the text of the abstract should be indented 5 spaces and begin on the line after the last line of the author's addresses. Note that the title is ALL CAPS, and that the authors names are in bold font. The abstract should be in 12-pt font, single spaced with left justified margins. The maximum length of the abstract, including title, authors, and addresses is 300 words. The abstract should be a single paragraph. Taxonomic authorities and references should be omitted.

POSTER PRESENTATIONS

The poster session provides an additional means of substantive discussion of papers for members attending the Meeting. An evening with no competing activities will be set aside for poster presentations. Posters scheduled for presentation in the poster session will be numbered, and listed like papers presented orally, with an abstract in the *Program Booklet*.

Each poster will be given a number and allotted a space 4' (height) x 6' (width). The spaces will be numbered ahead of time so that you will know where to place your poster.

Leave a 10 by 15 cm space at the upper left for the abstract number. Indicate the title, and name(s) of author(s) at the top of your poster so that it may be identified easily; the lettering for this heading should be at least 1" (72 points) high.

All illustrations should be prepared prior to the poster session. As a general guideline, text and illustrations should be large enough to be comfortably read from a distance of 3 to 4 feet. Hand-lettered material is generally unsuitable for effective poster presentation. Typed material should be done with the largest type possible, but at least 30 points in size. Illustrated materials should be kept simple. It also might be useful to have on hand a tablet of suitable sketch paper as well as a felt marker to use in discussion and further illustration.

The subject of the plenary session is "Linkages of Nematology to Emerging Disciplines" and includes presentations by Diana Wall: "Revisiting Van Gundy's Challenge: Have We Taken Our Blinders Off?", Jim Bever: "Soil community dynamics and plant species coexistence"; Byron Adams: "Nematodes as Model Systems in Emerging Disciplines"

There are **five symposia** being organized. They are;

- 1) "Sentinel taxa"; Organizer/moderator, Deb Neher
- 2) "Molecular Approaches to Nematode Biocontrol"; Organizer/moderator, Senyu Chen
- 3) "Nematode Crop Damage: the State of Current Knowledge"-Andrew Kloek, Divergence Co.
- 4) "Nematode-Bacterial Interactions" Organizer/moderator, David Bird
- 5) "Molecular Aspects of Resistance/Virulence" Organizer/moderator, Kris Lambert.

Terry Niblack has organized a **discussion session** on "Infraspecific Designations for Plant-Parasitic Nematodes". Research on host-parasite interactions of several species of economically important plant-pathogenic nematodes is complicated by the occurrence of what we used to call "physiological races." We hope to stimulate a lively discussion about the consistencies and inconsistencies used in naming these populations. If you have any interest in the taxonomic, genetic, or economic implications of the designation systems currently in use, please plan to attend and participate in this session. Additional tentative discussion session: "TheTree of Life Project: the Tylenchid-Cephalobid Clade" organized by Jim Baldwin, and another session as yet untitled on the Plant Parasitic Nematode Genomics White Paper, organized by David Bird.

We are also fortunate to be having a **workshop** on "Computation of Nematode Community Analyses" organized by Deb Neher. Participants bringing their own laptop computer have the opportunity to gain hands-on experience in computation of the most common indices using EXCEL and SAS software. *There will be a \$5.00 materials charge for this workshop, payable at the time of the meeting.* **NOTE:** If you are planning to attend this workshop, please send an email indicating your desire to attend, your preference (if any) for the AM or PM session, and your mailing address for class materials to lsutton1@unl.edu; cc to: deborah.neher@utoledo.edu to ensure materials and space will be available for you.

One mission of the Society of Nematologists is to provide students with the opportunity to showcase their graduate or undergraduate research at the annual meeting of the Society. This provides students the chance to organize their research findings and ideas and to present them to their colleagues. In addition, this meeting gives senior nematologists an opportunity to recruit graduate students, post doctoral research associates and faculty.

Dow AgroSciences has provided the Society of Nematologists with funds to support graduate student travel to attend the 2004 Annual Meeting. Four awards of \$500 each will be given to students presenting papers (oral or poster presentations) at the annual meeting in Estes Park, Colorado.

The qualifications of eligibility for the Travel Award include: a) current membership in the Society; b) full time student status or completion of graduate degree requirements no more than 12 months before the meeting; c) submission of abstract and completed application form found on the Society's web site (http://www.nematologists.org).

Students interested in applying for one of the four Dow AgroSciences Graduate Student Travel Awards are referred to the March Nematology Newsletter for more information. Criteria for selection: quality of science (determined from the submitted abstract) and financial need. Preference will be given to students in the final year of their graduate program (M.S. or Ph.D). A person may receive this award only once.


